First Aid Response

We provide the opportunity for everyone working with Young People

Another year on, so Scouting has changed everything. There will be a new eight-hour course coming into force which this year we have been able to implement on our last weekend of courses in May.

We had a mixture of Module 10B Practical sessions for those who had completed online courses for Module 10A back in September last year. March this year we had renewals only on the Saturday and on the Sunday, renewals and new Leaders.

In May we had a Saturday for Renewals and Sunday for Renewals and new Leaders.

Over all the courses we have 77 all completed their Modules 10a & 10b training. In addition to those, we have several who have attended First Aid at Work courses and I have met with them or spoken with them and talked through the parts that are needed by Scouting and completed practical sessions on the use of the AED

A slight change to our day, now, is that we do not serve a lunch or evening meal but ask the participants to bring their own. This way every one has something they can eat and caters for all dietary needs. We do serve teas and coffees all day including cake in the afternoons.

Our next weekend will be November 26th for Renewals and 27th for Renewals and new Leaders including Young Leaders.

I can assure you that the premises and methods we will be using will still be within the COVID rules of hygiene.

Back in May, I went to visit a Cub Pack with my friend Annie with her AED. All the Cubs loved using the equipment and were very good at it. Please give me a call if you would like me to bring the equipment to your section.

A little reminder to everyone, carry a Mask (if you are able to wear one) and gloves in your First Aid Kit and or pockets, and do not be afraid to stop and help someone in trouble. Remember the golden rule for CPRNO KISSING!!

A system to help parents find Scouting in their area.

First introduced by Scout Association and adopted in our

District in 2013.

Some of you may be asking what W2J is.it is a process set up by Head Quarters some fifteen years ago which of course included 'Training' for the role. Parents log into the Scout site and

complete a W2J form. HQ forward the request to the designated co-ordinator for your District, in East Grinstead this has been me since the scheme was set up.

I receive requests mostly by HQ, through our own web site or quite frequently by our designated telephone line 0845 475 5378 This not just for young people but I have had a couple of adults come through and are now in post with Groups. More especially this year we have two Ukrainian Cub Scouts and one Scout.

How can you help me to help you grow? Firstly how long is your waiting list? Do you have any spaces? Let me know if you have any changes in the group, such as section days of the week and times of meetings. Change of Leadership in the sections. One question I get asked a lot by Parents, especially those that phone me, is how much are the Subs? Please can you send me an update for each section in your Group? Once you have made contact with the family, please let me know, so that I can close my file, keeping within the GDPR guidelines.

Now we are out of lock down we have been busy with people wanting to join, not just Beavers but several for the cub, scout and explorer sections. In total I have processed 116 requests and still have a few outstanding who have not replied when I have asked for further information or which night or the week suits them best, or for Beavers a Saturday morning. Instead of the requests coming in for the rising 6's I am getting quite a few who are already 7.

All section Leaders are fantastic at responding to me and the Parents, however, it is frustrating when Groups have Membership Secretaries who do not respond to me or ask the Parents for the details already sent to them. Under GDPR, I do not keep details once the young person has been placed on a waiting list by the group or offered a place this is why I need a response from the Leader or Group Secretary. Some new Parents do not understand we are all volunteers, they expect a place immediately. I do politely explain we are not a 'club' and we do have waiting lists some longer than others.

I am working to the way that HQ expects; I try to respond to Parents within a 48 hour window.

I would like to finish my report by saying 'thank you' to those Leaders who really engage with W2J, you know who you are and long may you have full sections and long waiting lists.
